Forum on Ohio's Charter Schools Monday April 20, 7 p.m.

Join us at the Clifton Recreation Center (320 McAlpin Avenue, Cincinnati 45220) for a public forum that will present varied perspectives on Ohio's "community schools," commonly referred to as charters.

Panelists for "Ohio's Charter Schools: Are They Accountable?" will include Aaron Churchill, research analyst of the Thomas Fordham Institute, a charter school sponsor; Steve Dyer, an attorney and education policy fellow of Innovation Ohio; Ohio Senator Bill Seitz representing the 8th District; and Mary Ronan, superintendent of Cincinnati Public Schools. Journalist Krista Ramsey will serve as moderator for the forum.

Charter Schools were authorized by the Ohio legislature in 1997 to offer urban school children an alternative to their public schools. Have they lived up to their promise?

The panel will cover basic facts about the founding and funding for charter schools, as well as their promise, performance and strategies for improvement. Speakers will present their findings and answer questions from the audience.


Running from Crazy: A Life Journey with Mariel Hemingway



Air Quality Advisory

Formerly Known as Smog Alerts

The name may have changed but the goal of the new program is the same: alert people in the area about pending poor air quality and encourage a response.

The <u>Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency</u>, in partnership with <u>OKI Regional Council of Governments</u>, changed the name of the <u>SMOG ALERTS</u> program to AIR QUALITY ADVISORY on April 1. The new program aims to re-energize the public before stricter Environmental Protection Agency ozone standards go into effect this fall.



AIR QUALITY
ADVISORY will bring
attention to conditions
expected the next day that
will raise ozone levels to
an "unhealthy for sensitive
groups" range. If
conditions are such that a
pollutant will exceed an
EPA established standard,
the Air Quality Advisory

will issue an alert. The pollutants that are monitored include: carbon monoxide, particulate matter, sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxide, ozone and lead.

The alerts are designed to encourage a variety of responses. People with respiratory conditions will

be encouraged to take precautions such as remaining indoors and avoiding excessive exertion. Those utilizing gas powered equipment such as cars and lawn mowers will be encouraged to refuel their vehicles after sundown, which reduces contributions to smog formation. Residents will be encouraged to use alternative means of transportation such as transit, bicycles and walking.


Are You Up for a Challenge?
